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Incumbent's Report

Rev Paul Schumacher - Interim Priest-in-Charge

Over the past year, the Anglican Parish of Salt Spring Island has come a long way toward the appointment of our next incumbent. The prayerful efforts of so many of our congregation has been a blessing to my time with you as interim priest-in-charge. Thank you all for your support and care of Lynn and I through these past months of personal health issues.

During our worship cycle in 2024, we made some changes which helped us establish liturgy patterns that have new meaning and that also have accommodated BC ferry schedules, With the help of our active retired clergy, visiting clergy, and our licensed lay ministers, we have been able to share in meaningful worship during the weeks when I was unable to get to Salt Spring Island. With their generous assistance, we enjoyed festival celebrations throughout the church year when it was impossible for me to get to the island and then back home in reasonable time. Thank you all!

Our pastoral care team has been active throughout the past year offering home visits and communion when possible. Our Prayer chain continues quietly in its work. For this, I am so very thankful.

I wish to thank the wardens, the parish administrator, the parish council, the altar guild, servers, lay ministers, flower arrangers, music director, musicians, and choir members, plus everyone who has made my introduction to the parish easier than I had anticipated. Blessings to all of you. You are a gift and you give me hope for the future of our church.

The continued use of your nametags during Sunday worship has made it so much easier for me to get to know people's names. Thank you for helping me get to know each of you. When our next incumbent arrives, please continue to wear your nametags at all services, as this makes knowing you by name a much less onerous task.

Thank you also to Synod staff and Bishop Anna for all their support in this ministry here on Salt Spring Island.

2024 has been an opportunity for us to visit some new patterns of worship, to share many celebrations, to share the loss of several parishioners, and to enjoy a wonderful music program and of course our community involvement here at All Saints. With the Holy Spirit's guidance, the future is indeed bright, and God knows where we will be called to serve as a parish. I somehow don't believe the journey will be boring for anyone attached to the Parish of Salt Spring Island.

2025 will be a time for more discernment which will lead us onto a path toward the arrival of our next incumbent for our island parish. I ask for your prayers and support as we journey together in hope and in faith with God's Spirit guiding us onward.

Roles and Responsibilities

Parish Executive

"In collaboration with the incumbent, the churchwardens are responsible for administering and managing the business (temporal) affairs of the congregation."

"The churchwardens, with the assistance of the treasurer, are responsible for the care and accounting of all money given by the congregation for any purpose and from any source."

In carrying out these responsibilities, the "Parish Executive" (**Rev Paul Schumacher, Ruth Pickett Seltner, Simon Wheeler, Sally Carr and Gloria McEachern**) is grateful for the support of our treasurer, **Andrew Peat,** and that of our envelope secretary, **Carolyn Evans,** for their advice and diligence in carrying out day-to-day financial tasks.

Churchwardens

"The duties of the churchwardens whether chosen by the incumbent or the parishioners, shall be the same" and are as specified in Regulation R7.7.1 C of the Canons². Notably, "Churchwardens must always act jointly; they cannot exercise their powers separately, nor can one act without the consent of the other. Additionally, they must always function in concert with the incumbent."

Parish Council

"The duty of parish council shall be to assist and support the incumbent and the churchwardens in the general business and the programs of the parish." ref. Canon 7.8 A². The Parish Council is thus the Advisory Committee for the Parish elected from and by the parishioners at the **Annual Vestry Meeting**.

Our Parish Council presently comprises a minimum of six parishioners, three of whom are elected each year for a term of two years.


Additional *ex-officio* members of Parish Council are the Incumbent, the Churchwardens, the Parish Treasurer, and the Chair, Outreach Committee.

Stewardship Campaign 2024

The 2024 Stewardship Campaign was launched on Sunday, November 10th and concluded with the blessing of the pledge forms for time, talent, and money on Sunday, November 24th.

The campaign focused on our need to give in order to be both spiritually and psychically healthy. Giving back some portion of what we are given is how we give thanks to God. 38 pledges of time and talent were received. Those have been collated and the pledges for each area of activity, e.g. readers, intercessors, pastoral care, gardens, etc. have been passed to the leads for those areas.

The Treasurer reports that 40 financial pledges for 2025 have been received for a total giving of \$139,340 as compared to 30 pledges in 2024 for givings of \$107,040 - a 33.3% increase in number of pledges and a 7.7% increase in total givings.

The Anglican Parish of Salt Spring Island is alive and healthy in all forms of Christian commitment.



All Saints' parish musical journey recounted

A 30-year Music Makers retrospective

When I look back over 30 years of my involvement with the musical outreach of the Anglican Parish of Salt Spring Island, I am filled with gratitude and amazement at the profound creativity, harmonious collaboration and satisfaction it has brought to me and so many in the community.

Music took it's place in the heart of the parish in worship and beyond when All Saints bythe-Sea was dedicated in 1994. From then on it opened its doors to a variety of singers and musicians from both on and off the island.

Most music lovers on Salt Spring will have heard of or experienced something of the musical events in the parish in the form of Music and Munch, Simply Organic and, most recently, Tea à Tempo. Perhaps less well known is Music Makers, the name of the production team behind the recital series offered over the years.

It all began in 1996, when I was excited to become a founding member of the Liturgy and Arts Society together with Margaret Jardine, Alan Robertson

and our newly appointed priest Bryan Bjerring. The aim was to assist the members of the parish and wider community to express their creative gifts through the arts. Anglican Caterers and Music and Munch were born on June 12 that year, the brainchild of Barry Valentine, music director, and Ed Petty, gourmet chef. The concert was attended by an audience of 12, who were treated to fine music followed by a delicious lunch. Word soon got around, and Wednesdays became regu-

lar concert days for the next 20 years, serving hundreds of meals to a growing fan club.

When the Liturgy and Arts Society came to an end in December 2000, Music Makers took over and became responsible for Music and Munch, which was already noted as an ideal venue for not only experienced musicians to promote their work but also for the support of young musicians, students of the middle and high schools, and young choirs. Music Makers also pro-

duced an annual Flower Festival concert, a Remembrance Day concert, several benefit concerts and the annual Carols for Christmastide event, which continues today.

Valentine's friendship with internationally known organists Nicholas Fairbanks, Jeffrey Smith, Hugh McLean and Gerald Wheeler led to some remarkable organ recitals. Eventually, in 2002, Simply Organic was added to the musical events when Music and Munch summer concerts were not in full swing. Played almost exclusively by Valentine, the morning recital followed by muffins, coffee and lively discussion was enjoyed by a surprising number of organ enthusiasts.

Tea à Tempo began in the fall of 2016 when the long hours and dedicated lunch contribution of Anglican Caterers was no longer sustainable. Disappointed audience members talked us into continuing with a less taxing offering of tea and treats in the afternoon following a concert. Despite the pandemic shutting us down in 2020, we soon picked up where we left off the following as concert.

ing year.

The success of the several long-running concert series can be attributed to the excellent acoustics of All Saints, the generous support of island musicians, warm and loyal audience members, the much-enjoyed collabo-

ration with Anglican Caterers, and the unending support of the Driftwood and other local events calendars.

I am a member of the most recent Music Makers team, including Ralph Dom, Linda Floyd, Sarah Mathieson and Anke Smeele. We have enjoyed 15 years of producing the concert series and now feel it is time for us to retire as one and hand over the torch. Above and beyond the hard work and commitment of providing a wealth of music for the community, the rewards of mentoring and supporting the musical life of the island have been a joy. It is with gratitude and celebration we say farewell.

Hall Use

In 2024 public use of our two Hall spaces and church Sanctuary continued with moderate year-over-year increase both in number of groups and events, as well as in total revenue, this, despite the Salt Spring Middle School, located directly across the street from All Saints, having turned into a Community Centre with over a dozen spaces available for rental use by the community.

Hourly rates for use of our Halls and Sanctuary spaces have not increased over five years so it is recommended that Parish Council consider review in 1st or 2nd Q this year and potentially increase rental fees as appropriate. Should we elect to increase hourly and event rate(s) for 2026, all current Hall Use groups must be provided 6-months' notice as a courtesy.

Evening Prayer Services

Evening Prayer at 17:00 on Thursdays replaced the Eucharist in June of 2024 when the Venerable Dennis Hayden was no longer available to preside at a Eucharist. Pastoral Care

The **Pastoral Care Leadership team** presently consists of 3 people, **Noreen Davies, Bridget Metzger and Dale Storm**.

The **Ven. Dennis Hayden and Canon Doreen Davidson** stepped down from the team during the year due to the weight of other responsibilities.

In September another meeting was held with the Pastoral Care Team of Volunteers (total in attendance was 7) who agreed to help out in the following various ways:

- 1. Visit parishioners in long-term care homes on an on-going basis.
- 2. Join the Hymn Sing at Greenwoods once monthly.
- 3. Take home communion to people unable to attend church.
- 4. Visit people who need support, especially the elderly who are living alone.
- 5. Visit people in hospital (acute care).
- 6. Provide a ride to church for a parishioner, as needed.
- 7. Provide a meal (or more) for someone returning home after hospital or for someone who is grieving.
- 8. Provide support on a one-to-one basis to new widows and widowers during the first 6 months.
- 9. Keep vigil with the dying who do not have family members with them, or relieve family members who are keeping vigil.
- 10. Retired clergy, when available, offer Spiritual help to those at the end of life, confession, absolution and anointing with oil; and counselling to the bereaved family.
- 11. Prayer: privately, through the Prayer Chain, the Prayers of the People, the Healing Station.

There are presently 11 parishioners living in Assisted Living at Meadowbrook, Heritage Place and Braehaven; 7 parishioners in Full Time Care at lady Minto and Greeenwoods; 4 parishioners who are in their 90's and living independently at home. Of those, 9 parishioners need a ride to church and an additional 7 have requested to be prayed for in the prayer chain and/or the Prayers of the People. **This is a total of 29 people who are vulnerable in one way or another.**

It is our hope and prayer that the new incumbent will be able to give their strong support to this ministry in our Parish in the coming years.

Prayer Chain

The Prayer Chain offers ongoing prayers by request. There are currently 25 people, including clergy, who offer these confidential, private prayers on a regular basis. Updates are sent out regularly to the people who pray ("pray-ers") so that their prayers can stay current. At the end of each bi-monthly period a newly updated version of prayer requests is sent out to the pray-ers, with thanksgiving for answered prayers.

Many folks, especially those battling with cancer or chronic conditions, are prayed for on an ongoing basis. We pray for healing where possible and for health of body, mind, and spirit.

Requests for prayer may be made directly to <u>prayers@saltspringanglican.ca</u>. Prayers will be sent out as soon as possible, usually on the same day they are requested.

To respect confidentiality, please ensure that you have the permission of the person for whom you would like to request prayer.

According to Diocesan policy, the Prayer Chain members are appointed by the Incumbent and Churchwardens. If you are interested in this ministry, please contact the Priest-in-Charge or one of the Churchwardens.

Safe Church

Lynne Fraser, Safe Church Liaison

Overview

"The Safe Church program ensures that our churches are places of safety from the harm of misconduct that can occur in situations when there is an imbalance of power.

Safe Church training is designed to:

- 1. Ensure our parishes are places of safety and wholeness for those who come to us seeking the love of Christ.
- 2. Ensure all of our volunteers and employees are aware of their own personal safety and are equipped to manage their own personal risk."

The Safe Church Program and a Criminal Record Check (CRC) are required for parish council members, paid staff (including clergy), organist, choir director, envelope secretary, children and youth workers, pastoral visitors, treasurer and all others who handle money and volunteer staff including parish administration, and grounds and janitorial maintenance.

Safe Church Training

I am pleased to report that 48 volunteers have now completed their Safe Church Training. We also have 4 volunteers who are in the process of completing the requirements. And, we have 5 paid employees who have completed all requirements for Safe Church.

Changes Are Coming in 2025

- 1. We no longer have an option to submit hard copy CRC applications to the Criminal Records Review Program (CRRP). Please contact your Safe Church Liaison for the link to the online submission process.
- 2. The diocese is no longer using *Praesidium* as part of our Safe Church program requirements. Those who need to complete the program may watch the 35-minute video instead. Please connect with your Safe Church Liaison.

I would like to once again thank **Ron Dyck** and **Joe Egan** for assisting me in running group and/or small training sessions and to all those who made the commitment to participate and complete the Safe Church Training.

We meet Monday evenings by Zoom for about one-and-a-half hours, finding time before we close to share prayer-requests and to pray together. We bring varied perspectives to our discussions not always agreeing but certainly encouraging each other as we share in our faith journeys.

Having Jesus for Dinner

The **Rev Chris Levan** hosted a bible study series called "Having Jesus for Dinner" on four Wednesday evenings in the September and November. The series was an exploration of the three miracles that are

embedded in the Jesus meal and is based on Chris's book entitled "Having Jesus for Dinner, Community or Cannibalism - Can Christians Reset the Table for a New Expression of Jesus' "Holy" Meal?".

We spent four sessions during September to November examining what it means to "have Jesus for dinner". Each session began with parts of a traditional Middle Eastern dinner.

- 1. We first examined the cultural/political matrix of Jesus--how living in his time meant facing Roman occupation, enculturation and commercialization.
- 2. Next, we looked at the logistics of meal preparation and presentation. How hard is it to eat with Jesus? What did it look like? What did we eat?
- 3. We then examined the two basic meals of Jesus... one in which he is the host and the other in which he becomes the meal. We'll examine how his meals were changed over time and what that meant for the Christian community.
- 4. And finally we had an actual full meal "with Jesus" a group of 15 of us from the parish and community ate what he ate (and more) and shared community together thanks to John and Bridget for hosting this at their new digs in Kingfisher Cove!

Faith in Doubt - God Talk for Secular Ears

Community Labyrinth: A Dream Becoming a Reality

If you have not yet seen the Labyrinth, it's easy to see over the fence at the Purdy-Cunningham Cemetery at 710 Upper Ganges Road, just a long block from the 'central' intersection.

We heartily thank our Wardens, the Parish Council, and the Manager of Cemeteries for their support. We thank our parish Treasurer, who records all donations and issues cheques for the Labyrinth Project's receipted expenses. And, again, we most heartily thank all our contributors!

Once again Outreach was given \$7,500 from the parish budget. This plus donations from individual parishioners allowed the Committee to support a lot of various projects this year.

International

- Indigenous Responsive Grant Fund (support for emergency projects in Indigenous communities)
- Midwifery in Indigenous Communities

- Advent Conspiracy Water upgrades in Indigenous communities
- Canadian Disaster Relief Fund (support for emergency disaster relief in Canada)

I particularly want to thank the members of the Parish who gave and continue to give so generously to these projects. Nothing happens without your support.

Friday Community Meals Bridget Metzger and Susan Grace (United Church)

The Community Meals, held in the lower hall of the United Church at noon on Fridays, continues to be a gracious, welcoming place for those who come to eat, visit, and volunteer. We are blessed by our collaboration with each other. Volunteers come from the United Church, the Unitarian, the Anglican Church, and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. Those who have volunteered from All Saints this year are Sarah and Chas Belknap, Ron Dyck and Walter Stewart, Sally Carr and Ethel Magnus, Carles Roch-Cunill and Bridget Metzger, Peg Gabor and Elaina Hyde-Mills, and Dave Phillips and Tim Hayes as substitutes.

We serve about 25-30 people each week. The meal tends to be a hearty one, prepared by Community Services, and we round it out with fruit, cookies and sometimes homemade desserts which are very much appreciated!

Over the cold months, our guests come in to warm up and can pick up winter clothes as needed.

On Friday December 20th, a delicious turkey dinner was served with all the trimmings, and each guest received a gift of new warm socks and a bag of homemade cookies, and they could help themselves to toiletries as needed.

The community meal touches each of us in different ways, and we each express our commitment to service in our own unique manner. There is a place for all at our table and we are grateful.

Gabriel's Kitchen Gloria McEachern

Gabriel's Kitchen, initiated by Kajin Goh and the Chuan Society, is a remarkable program in that it is organized and mostly staffed by the housing-challenged folk it is designed to serve. All Saints, in consultation with parish council, has been hosting Gabriel's Kitchen as an outreach to our community. Gabriel's Kitchen is named after Gabriel Bonga, an individual who served, on his own initiative, soup in the parks. Gabriel, unfortunately, died in a boating accident in 2020.

The meals at All Saints began in October 2023 as a Thanksgiving potluck dinner. Since then, a growing mix of Salt Springers including members of our congregation – notably **Gloria and Lucky McEachern, Sally Carr, Chas Belknap and Toto André Rodrigues**, volunteered Thursdays to cook and share meals. The final event was on December 26th when the All Saints' kitchen was closed for renovations.

Each dinner was prepared and served by a rotating crew of about 20 volunteers who cooked, set up, served and cleaned up in shifts. We served on average between 40 to 60 dinners. Supplies for the dinners are provided largely through donations from local restaurants, grocery stores and individuals. Recently the Community Foundation has stepped up to support the program

Gabriel's Kitchen moved in December to "The Hearth" – a large portable building on the site of the recently closed Phoenix School on Drake Road. The long-term vision for Gabriel's Kitchen is to run as a daily operation on a permanent site.

Angel Tree Dovene Steele

As one of our outreach programs, our parish has participated in the angel tree project for several years now. The idea is that we sponsor a family in the community who may need a little extra support at Christmas.

I am in touch with Family Place in late October, early November who in conjunction with community services pairs us with a family. This year, we sponsored a family of six: mom and dad, a 20-year-old boy a 17-year-old girl, a 12-year-old boy and a 4-year-old girl.

They forward me a list of items and/or family interests and hobbies that the family could use or may wish to have. I take the list and make gift tags with the wishes written on them which I hang on the tree in the narthex.

Many parishioners choose a tag and buy that gift. They wrap the gift, attach the tag and return it to the church. When the gifts are all received, I take them to Family Place before Christmas where they are picked up by the family. As well as specific items, I also include tags for gift cards for local grocery, pharmacy and hardware stores which of course are so useful and appreciated. Toys, books, pajamas, board games, sweaters, imaginative art supplies are just some of the great gifts received.

Our parishioners always give such heartfelt, beautiful and thoughtful gifts. The family is so appreciative and thankful. I too am overwhelmed and so grateful for your generosity and kindness.

Family Place Ruth Seltner

The Rectory is currently utilized by Family Place which is overseen by Community Services. This has been an ongoing Outreach Program for the Church. This year, the rent for Family Place increased to \$1,375 from \$750 per month, closer to being in line with the true cost of rentals on Island.

The time may be approaching for us to consider repurposing the Rectory for housing. In the meantime, we will discuss renewal of the Family Place lease on a month-to-month basis starting in April 2025.

Reconciliation with First Nations

"Getting to the truth was hard but getting to reconciliation will be harder. It requires that the paternalistic and racist foundations of the residential school system be rejected as the basis for an ongoing relationship. Reconciliation requires that a new vision, based on a commitment to mutual respect, be developed. It also requires an understanding that the most harmful impacts of residential schools have been the loss of pride and self-respect of Aboriginal people, and the lack of respect that non-Aboriginal people have been raised to have for their Aboriginal neighbours. Reconciliation is not an Aboriginal problem; it is a Canadian one. Virtually all aspects of Canadian society may need to be reconsidered." — Report of the Truth and Reconciliation Committee (TRC), Canada

As a parish we have committed to actively living into our responsibility to acknowledge our living history and act upon it, to support a way forward as Christians with our indigenous brothers and sisters. The first step in this process is truth. The parish has been taking steps towards increasing our knowledge on history and issues surrounding our relationships. Without this knowledge, it is difficult to move forward in a better way.

Faith and Climate Action

As a Parish we have committed ourselves:

- To educate ourselves on our individual and corporate response to climate change, climate justice, and sustainable living,
- To learn how we can mitigate and adapt to a changing climate right here on Salt Spring Island,
- To take actions relevant to our Salt Spring Island community such as: water conservation, reduce plastics, reducing our consumption of meat, etc.,
- To collaborate in actions with other faith communities, and
- To support and collaborate with existing local action groups, e.g. Transition Salt Spring: https://transitionsaltspring.com/

Through this we hope to increase our awareness of our responsibility as people of faith in addressing climate change, climate justice, and sustainable living on Salt Spring Island, and as individuals, do what

we can to responsibly implement adaptation and mitigation measures within our home and our community.

Star of the Sea aims to provoke reflective thinking and exploring the inward world of spirit, while deepening our awareness and understandings through a wide range of spiritually related areas of interest.

The intimate atmosphere at St. Mary's Church encourages sharing and learning from participants as well as from the programme leaders.

Once the final repair of the bathroom wall is completed, and once we are notified that the building is ready for activities again, Star of the Sea will require 6 – 8 weeks to plan programs, which we hope will start up in either April or in September 2025.

There is tweaking to be done but a very successful completion of initiative. This will need ongoing vigilance (perhaps monthly) as new people join tags will need to be created. As our dear parishioners pass it was decided that we would place the name tags in the memorial garden out back.

Large Sign on Lower Ganges Road - led by Debbi. I endeavour to change the quote every week - not always possible. When we have special events or services, for example the Christmas Bazaar, the Christmas Eve service; we advertise it on the big sign as well.

Website and Newsletter - led by John and Joe. The parish website (https://www.saltspringanglican.ca/) continues to be improved and kept up to date. **Chas Belknap** continues to photograph new parishioners so they can be added to the password-protected Parish Photo Directory – contact Joe, Chas or John for the password. The parish executive has been keen to communicate regularly with the parish during this interim time and since the fall have initiated weekly newsletters to keep us informed of parish news and events.

Other Initiatives: Our rack cards and bulletins were corrected by Claire and Sarah so they stated the new 10:30am time for the Sunday worship service. With Marjie and the committee there was an attempt to plan a *Welcoming Potluck Lunch* in September. Unfortunately, it became a timing issue with people being away etc., so it was dropped. Hopefully we will be able to create that event in 2025.

Closing Remarks: I would like to take this opportunity to thank the welcoming/communications individuals for their thoughtful role of leadership. Please remember that we all play a role in being welcoming and kind to all who enter our doors. Reach out, join coffee hour, chat or introduce yourself... in a very real sense we are all the welcome committee.

Building Renewal and Property Management – in service to our community

Property Management Committee

John Metzger

In consultation with parish council a **Property Management Committee** was more formally reinvigorated in September, comprising the following parishioners with their main areas of responsibility:

- **Bill Morrison** our parish maintenance contractor. In addition to routine maintenance and repairs, Bill is co-managing the kitchen renovation project with Colin and John.
- **Colin Lawler** a long history with the All Saints' building having served as project manager when the building was established some 30+ years ago. Colin will back-stop John and Bill during the kitchen renovation project.
- **Don Van Akker** –retired construction manager with a wide range of practical experience, is leading our efforts to address repairs to the All Saints' entry ramp.
- **Don Cunningham** with a long history with our parish buildings and close connections to the Salt Spring Island community, Don is our "corporate memory" on maintenance issues, notably our All Saints fire suppression system.
- **John Metzger** committee chair, and responsible to report on behalf of the committee to parish council; and working with Colin and Bill in managing the All Saints kitchen renovation project.
- **Ruth Pepin** with key responsibility to advise in the renovation of the All Saints kitchen.
- **Simon Wheeler** a churchwarden and lead responsibility for St Mary's maintenance and repair work.
- Walter Stewart key responsibilities with the deconsecration and sale of St Mark's, including liaison with the diocese, and our relationship with the real estate agent once the building goes on the market. Walter also worked extensively with John and Dal Brickenden in developing the building renewal projects in 2020 which remains the basis for planning maintenance and improvement projects at All Saints. We seek to raise funding, possibly from the sale of St Mark's in consultation with the diocese, for continued renovations and improvements to ensure we have a building that is an effective community resource well into the future and one that meets parish needs with a lower impact on the environment and on our annual operations and maintenance budgets.

St Mark's Church. Central

Walter Stewart

Since the time St Mark's was deconsecrated in 2022, with the advice of the diocese we have been working to resolve property alignment and driveway access issues. These were finally resolved in January 2025 with the construction of a new driveway enabling direct access between the property and North End Road. We thus hope to put the property and building onto the real estate market in 2025.

St Mary's Church, Fulford

In early 2024 the diocese asked us to temporarily close St Mary's because of water damage and rot in the washroom; they were concerned that there might be health issues with the possible presence of black mold. An on-island professional mold tester was engaged to examine the extent of the problem and although a small amount of rot and fungus were found to be present the amount of mold was not of immediate concern. Subsequent examination of the area revealed that much of the upper wall and roof of the washroom will need replacing before the building can be re-opened for general use. This work is expected to take place in the spring of 2025.


The oil-fired heating furnace was replaced with an electrical heat pump system, this was combined with an upgrade to the electricity supply to the church. The heating is now working well and is able to be controlled remotely through the building's Wi-Fi. The money for the heating upgrade came from part of the bequest from former parishioner **Margaret Mather**.

In the autumn the diocese directed us not to use the existing well for water as it is deemed to be too close to the cemetery, Island Health require a 100-foot clearance. We plan to have a potable water tank installed close to the building and will plumb that into the existing internal pipework. The tank will require refilling annually with good quality drinking water.

All Saints Kitchen Renovation

We are grateful to **Margaret Spencer** for her bequest enabling the parish to renovate the All Saints kitchen. Preliminary plans were prepared in 2023 with the project brief formally approved by both parish and diocesan councils. On the recommendation of the diocese, in September 2024 a *Kitchen Committee* comprising **Bill Morrison, Marjie Radford, Ruth Pepin and Molly Cunningham**, visited the recently renovated commercial kitchen at St Paul's Nanaimo. Following this visit, our design was revised and finalized, and procurement initiated for the appliances, components and cabinets, and our general contractor confirmed.



- · Stainless steel countertop and back splashes throughout
- · IKEA floor and wall cabinets and handles
- Replace flooring and overhead fluorescent lighting

Work, including plans to replace the cabinets in the lower hall kitchenette, commenced in January with plans to complete the work by the end of March 2025. Project supervision is being shared between **Bill Morrison, Colin Lawler and John Metzger.** Our main suppliers and contractors are:

- Michael Hunsberger Lighthouse Ventures, Salt Spring Island general contractor, including plumbing and electrical
- Russell-Hendrix, Victoria supply of commercial kitchen appliances (dishwaher, cooler, microwave) and accessories including stainless steel sinks, worktables, dishdollies, etc.
- Hubenig Bros. Benjamin Moore, Salt Spring Island commerical kitchen flooring supply and installation
- Millstone Heating & Sheetmetal, Duncan custom stainless steel countertops and backspashes
- IKEA wall and base cabinets and fittings

All Saints Entry Ramp Repairs

Don Van Akker and Don Cunningham

The ramp to the main entrance of All Saints has been deteriorating over the past years. Temporary repairs to the ramp were made in 2010 by **Don Van Akker and Don Cunningham** with the installation of the wood beam under the low end. At that time, we projected a five-year life. A post near the upper end was installed a few years later and an additional post was installed a year or so ago at the recommendation of our engineer. Permanent repairs or replacement are therefore urgently required.

During 2024, working in consultation with a local structural professional engineer, **Don Van Akker** developed plans and a project management approach to repair the existing ramp without the need for complete replacement. These were submitted in the form of a "project brief" approved by parish council in September 2024 and submitted in October to the diocese for presentation to diocesan council. However, since submission to the diocese, the project has been put "on hold" by parish council subject to the following:

- 1. Project financing: The financial position of the parish since initially approved by council in September 2024 has changed. Funding as initially approved is now not available.
- Scope of work and project management: The diocesan buildings advisor (Mark Oldnall)
 expressed reservations on the proposed scope of work and approach to project management.
 Mark and Don Van Akker are in discussion to reach a common understanding on the way forward
 in order 1) to ensure good value for money and 2) to minimize financial risk to the parish and
 diocese.

The project specifications and detailed engineering drawings remain available once the parish and diocese agree to re-submit the project brief. We encourage the diocese as owner to apply for a building permit through the CRD as soon as possible, thus enabling repairs to commence as soon as funds are available.

Other Building and Maintenance

All Saints Fire Suppression System: Working with the support of Troy Life and Fire Safety Ltd., Victoria we (thanks to **Don Cunningham** and **Joe Egan**) rectified deficiencies in the All Saints fire suppression system enabling full certification with our local the Fire Department.

All Saints Steeple - roof leak: We're grateful to the initiative of **Don and Elizabeth Van Akker and Don Cunningham** in resolving the long-standing roof leak under the All-Saints steeple!

Moisture damage to the wall adjacent to the back stairwell: A blocked permitter-drain at the back wall adjacent to the staircase was cleared in 2024 thanks to **Don Cunningham**. We remain concerned that leaks from the roof backed up from the blocked drain into the back wall and may have thus caused moisture damage. We plan to ask the contractor carrying out kitchen renovations to open the wall enabling us to examine and assess damage if any and initiate repairs if required.

Salt Spring Island Emergency Program – Emergency Reception Centre: The All Saints building was designated in 2019 as an *Emergency Reception Centre and Recovery Facility* available to be used as safe gathering places for people displaced from their homes as a result of an emergency or disaster. We meet with the Emergency Program Coordinator each year to carry out an inventory of our building facilities and update our Statement of Understanding for use of our facilities in the event of an emergency on Salt Spring Island – thanks to **Joe Egan** for coordinating this.

We remain grateful to **Bill Morrison** for his conscientious service throughout the year in addressing routine and emergency building-maintenance issues at all our properties.

We also express gratitude to **Gillian Pierson**, our custodian, who has moved on from her position at the end of September. We are thankful to have found her replacement in local resident **Kimoko Brown**, who in addition to residing nearby on Park Drive, has ample custodial experience in her "day job" as co-owner of a family run Guesthouse & Inn here on Salt Spring.

All Saints' Gardeners

The small team is finding our energy is not sufficient to keep things at their best and we need help, either professionally or with more volunteers. Nevertheless, passers by continue to tell us how much they enjoy the beauty of the garden.

The hillside at the far end of the parking lot continues to require maintenance although wildflowers, including foxgloves and feverfew, now grace the area and the periwinkle is slowly becoming more widespread. Blackberries are tenaciously appearing and ongoing removal is required.

My thanks also to **Terri Manuck**, who provides backup when I am not able to be present at an interment and who has a wealth of local history that is very useful to me, a relative newcomer to the Island. A thank you to **Joe Egan**, who is often the first contact for families wishing to purchase a plot or preparing for the interment of a family member. And, not least, an appreciation for the priests who preside at the graveside services, providing pastoral care with empathy and compassion.
